## **Text of submission**

Casualisation in Australian universities is increasing. Until 2008, when I retired, I was the Head of a medium-sized School. Over my 12 years in this position, I found the pressure from senior management to casualise increase year by year. In fact, budgeting was done the basis of an assumption of increased casualisation.

Post-retirement, I have now taken occasional teaching jobs on a casual basis. So now my colleagues are those whose casual contracts I was unhappily signing all those years.

Their lives are not easy. The pay is poor.

The pay does not match qualifications; most casuals being PhD students or having completed PhDs.

Casuals are paid only for the semester weeks they teach and have no income during semester breaks; I have seen resultant cases of acute poverty.

Casuals work many more hours than they are paid for; e.g. there are nominal hours for marking and student consultations yet \*no\* casual I know has ever completed these tasks within the paid time.

There is increased pressure to complete work online without acknowledgement that this mode (especially for marking assignments) is much more labour-intensive than the traditional modes.

My reason for writing is simply to point out that academic work (sometimes still thought of as a privileged sector) is far from immune from the exploitation of a large casual workforce. I hope it doesn't fall below your radar.
